"I really don't like this", said a guest to me, pointing to the newly opened labyrinth. "I much preferred the Quiet Garden which was there before".

"I am sorry to hear this.", I replied, "Did you often use the Quiet Garden?".

"Never", she said, "but I got used to it being there."

This is when I realised that her main concern was that her 'beloved' Ammerdown had changed, and she did not like it one little bit.

This made me ponder about change, and how one introduces it in a place like Ammerdown, which is loved by so many.

I know from personal experience that change can be threatening. However, life never stands still. Like it or not the environment in which Ammerdown operates has changed dramatically since 1973 – the year it all began.



Consider for example the decline of institutional religion and the growth in 'new spiritualities', especially amongst young people; or the changing

face of ecumenism and of interfaith; or the rise in religious fundamentalism. Think also about the ongoing technological revolution which has brought about brand new methods of communicating, learning and interacting.

The reality is that organisations like Ammerdown have to adapt to their changing environment in order to survive. The challenge is therefore not whether to change but HOW to change in a way that preserves the organisation's core mission, values and ministry.

Ammerdown is undoubtedly facing some hard questions as it looks to the next five years - especially so at a time of widespread financial squeeze and ageing clientele. The reassuring fact is that Ammerdown has, over the last 40 years, managed to adapt successfully without ever compromising its ideals or its ethos. With God's grace and guidance, I am confident that Ammerdown will not only endure and grow but also continue to be **"a place where heaven and earth meet"** (which is how, ten years ago, a Methodist leader famously described Ammerdown...).
