Now here is an intriguing thought:

"If you do what you've always done, you'll get what you have always got."

I heard this quoted several times in January when 21 professionals working in peace-building and conflict transformation gathered at Ammerdown .

Ammerdown, which has peace-building as one of its charitable objectives, had invited these professionals to spend two days away from the office to reflect together on the impact of their work and look to the future.

For me as Director of the Ammerdown Centre, it was a privilege to attend the discussions as an observer. The collective experience and know-how in

the room was simply staggering. Between them they must have had first-hand knowledge of most, if not all, conflict zones in the world! There was deep frustration that too often their work 'picks up the pieces' of senseless armed conflict which could have been avoided. But there was also enormous goodwill and commitment in the room: they all believed in the work they were doing, and were determined to continue whatever may.

exploring new ways of bringing about a more peaceful world – hence the quote at the top. It was not so much about doing things better as doing things differently. The energy and creativity that, together, they brought to the process was breath-taking. By the end of the two days, the group had come up with an action plan to work together on a campaign to wake up the British public to what is actually happening around us – the true cost of armed conflict and the proven benefits of investing in peace instead.

They all said they would like to meet again in six months' time to review progress. Needless to say, Ammerdown was happy to offer its facilities again in order to support the process. No-one knows where it will take us. However, just think how exciting it would be if, in a few years' time, an amazing accomplishment on the national stage could be traced back to a discreet two day gathering at Ammerdown in January 2014!

New guest accommodation... or perhaps not!

No, the chalet-like cabin that has suddenly appeared on our front lawn is not for guests! It is in fact a biomass cabin that heats the main Centre through wood-pellets rather than oil. This is a very exciting development for Ammerdown - much cheaper to run, environmentally friendly and financially advantageous thanks to



the incentives that the Government will pay Ammerdown for the next 20 years. The initial capital investment was, however, considerable. We could never have considered it without the £100,000 legacy we received in 2012. Investing it in the long term future of the Centre was, our Trustees thought, the wisest way to use such a large amount of money, and we are therefore deeply grateful to Mr Ney, who left Ammerdown the money - as well as to all our other friends who have remembered Ammerdown in their will. Bequests truly make a huge difference to us because they come over and above our normal income and can be spent on improvements that we would otherwise be unable to afford. Dilys Fisher, the leader of our enamelling courses, shared the following with us after her last residential course: "The participants came from very different places in terms of lifestyle, cultures and responsibilities, yet formed a very supportive group. As the week went on, they started to talk about what they were trying to sort out in their lives. I find it helps to share concerns with others as often

we already have the answers in us and just need a bit of encouragement to discern them. In my experience, accepting the supportive listening and love of others often enables people to draw on their own strength and gain the courage to make decisions they had not dared make before. Each member of the group gave that sort of support to each other, and it was really lovely to see. I only wish I had discovered Ammerdown earlier. I am sure I would personally have benefited greatly from it!"

Amazing first year for the Somer Valley Foodbank

Readers may remember that Ammerdown has not only been actively involved in helping to set up a Foodbank locally, but has also been acting as its secretariat ever since. The 'Somer Valley Foodbank' was officially launched in January 2014 and has already helped over 1,500 people (including over 500 children) with food parcels at times when money was so scarce that they could not afford to buy food. Most local churches are actively involved, alongside 100 individual volunteers. This is an amazing achievement in an era which is often accused of not being very caring! It is an absolute privilege for Ammerdown to be involved in such a worthy project locally, and we are committed to continuing to help in any way we can.
