## Sion Constitution (1984)

- #3 ... the Church, reflecting on her own origin and mission, has rediscovered her roots in God's revelation to Israel.
- #4 Our faith in Jesus Christ unites us to the Jewish people and at the same time separates us from them. Jesus Christ, Son of God, was made man in this people to whom God first revealed his name. In him, who sums up in himself the law and the prophets, the Church is linked to the Jewish people in her origin, in her continuing history and in the final destiny the Kingdom of God to which all creation aspires.
- #7 The revelation of the Word of God in the Old Testament is the common root of Judaism and Christianity. In the Church, we interpret the Scriptures in the light of the Christ event. We are also attentive to the way the Bible is interpreted by the Jewish people in their life and tradition. We thereby grow in the appreciation of our own roots and in an understanding of Judaism. We are called to foster this appreciation and understanding in the Church.
- #15.2 Through various forms of catechetics and pastoral work we contribute to the building of the ecclesial community. This work is an important means of deepening an awareness within the Church of the Jewish roots of Christianity.
- #60.3 According to the seasons and liturgical feasts we unite ourselves to the Jewish people in their prayer, remembering that our liturgy has its roots in Judaism.
